## Letter from Lew *by Lew Hurst, Superintendent*

As we bring in the new year, we want to share important updates regarding the ongoing privatization process and what lies ahead in 2026. This marks the final year that adult services staff will be employees of the Seneca County Opportunity Center. By January 1, 2026, these dedicated team members will officially join Preferred Pathways, continuing their commitment to providing high-quality services to adults in our community.

Additionally, starting January 1, transportation services for adults will no longer be provided by the Seneca County Board of Developmental Disabilities. Instead, transportation for day habilitation services will be managed directly by Preferred Pathways and other private providers. This change is part of our effort to streamline services and enhance flexibility for individuals and families. Rodney Biggert, Executive Director of Preferred Pathways, will operate out of the Optima Building and part of the Fairlane Building to ensure seamless service delivery. Currently, Preferred Pathways serves approximately 120 adults.

So far, the transition to privatization has gone very smoothly, with individuals choosing from a variety of providers across the county. These options are helping us deliver more personalized and effective services. Although we are no longer the provider of services, we still fund these programs and services in Seneca County.

Looking ahead on 2026, our focus will shift toward school-based services. We are excited to announce plans for additional classrooms to meet the growing demand for children's services. Over the past several years, the Opportunity Center's census has changed significantly, and we now serve as many children as adults—a reflection of our evolving community needs.

Thank you for your continued support as we navigate these changes and work together to provide the best possible services for individuals and families in Seneca County.

## SCBDD President Erin Simmons goes to DC

A group of Ohio advocates traveled to Washington, D.C., to meet with congressional officials and highlight urgent concerns about the potential impact of Medicaid and tax cuts on families and children in Ohio. They emphasized that these cuts threaten vital county services funded largely through Medicaid and local taxes, worsen staffing shortages in schools and developmental providers, and lead to long delays in essential medical and behavioral services for children. The advocates warned that such reductions could have devastating short- and long-term effects on children's well-being, family stability, and community health, underscoring the critical importance of early intervention programs that save costs and improve outcomes for children with developmental disabilities. Despite tight schedules, their engagement left a strong impression on lawmakers, reaffirming the need for ongoing dialogue and support.
